



Engagement continues to be high while we are beginning to see a slight increase in students of concern at the high school and Beloit Learning Academy.

There is evidence that there is a drop in GPA when comparing Term 1: 2019-2020 and Term 1: 2020-21. The staff have been responsive to concerns and have developed strategies to increase support of students.




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
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
Students: I learn best

561 Students responded to the survey (email directly to high school students)


- 273 student prefer to learn at school




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
Parent/Guardian: My child(ren) learns best

Parent/Guardian: I send my child(ren) to...




1806 Families responded to the survey (This represent about 2615 students)

- 106 families would send some of their students to school and keep some in Distance Learning




Staff: I work at...




Staff: Students learns best 620 Responses

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(Choice 1) [Current Option]

Beloit Virtual Learning School: Full time at home

(Choice 2) [If approved]

Cohort Model: Includes 2 In-Person days and 2 Distance Learning days per week with simulcasting

(Choice 3) [Current Option]

Distance Learning: Simulcasting schedule 4 days at home per week with the same classroom

UPDATED MODEL

(Choice 2)

Cohort Model: Includes 2 In-Person days and 2 Distance Learning days per week with simulcasting



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- Students organized into Group A or Group B to determine weekly schedule for In-Person and at Distance Learning
- Transportation will continue to be provided
- Breakfast and Lunch will continue to be provided
- Health and Safety Plans updated & provided
- Technology training for simulcasting provided
- Training for Instructional Model provided

Weekly Schedule:

- Monday & Tuesday:
 - Group A In-Person and Group B at home streaming a live feed from the classroom.
- Wednesday:
 - Non-Instructional Day
- Thursday & Friday:
 - Group A and group B switch.



Food Service and Transportation



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Bus Cleaning

Buses will be cleaned and sanitized between ever-changing world. routes

Face Coverings

Driver and Students will be required to wear a face covering

Self-Transport

We will encourage parents/guardians to self-transport during this time, if possible

Food Service

Breakfast and Lunch meals will be provided to In-Person students in the building

7-day Meal Packs will be available on Wednesday's (delivery and pickup)

Seating for meal service will incorporate the use of plexiglass dividers

Transportation/Busing

Student Capacity is **24 student per bus** on a full-size bus.

Students will sit staggered to ensure social distancing.

Transportation needs/routing will be based on building cohorts

Start and end times of the school day for In-Person will not change from prior year



Building Logistics



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Isolation Rooms

Rooms identified within buildings with input from building administration, Director of School Health and -changing world. Facilities Department

UV Air Filtration have been installed in isolation rooms

Nursing Supports

All health room staff will have had the opportunity to be vaccinated prior to students returning face-to-face. Health Room staff will handle all student/staff screening and contact tracing

Testing and Vaccine

Working with Beloit Health Systems for testing training

Working with the Health Dept and Beloit Health Systems on vaccination

Signage

Directional Signage

Screener Signage

Precautionary Measures, Hygiene, and Informational Signage

Building Cleaning

Aramark cleaning expectations and protocols will be provided to buildings outlining cleaning protocols

Thorough cleaning procedures will occur daily, with emphasis on high touch points during attendance days/times

Microfiber cloths and cleaner provided to every classroom for wipe down. System for replacement of dirty microfibers daily

Cafeteria tables and dividers cleaned in between meal serving times

Social Distance Markers

Floor decals for tile and carpet flooring

PPE

District providing cloth masks for staff and students Disposable PPE (masks, gloves, gowns) and plexiglass provided to buildings and nursing staff for individual, student-specific needs



* Athletics and Activities

Field Trips and **Large Gatherings**

Suspend all field trips and event gatherings at all grade levels during this time

Clubs

When able, clubs will take place with social distancing and all safety measurements

Athletics

Beloit will follow the Big 8 Conference which is suspended until January 25

Beloit's Staged Athletic Approach will continue to follow WIAA and Rock County Health Department to develop guidance

Stages

Stage 1: Virtual Conditioning (general conditioning) – If county moves to Safer At Home Stage

Stage 2: Open Gym (sport-related activity) – Phase 1+

Stage 3: Open Gyms and Contact days (Coaching / start of season) - Phase 1+ and declining positivity rates

Stage 4 & 5: Practices (Competitions) – In-Person Instruction or Board includes in Distance Learning



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Small Group Support contribute to an

[If in Distance Learning]

Building-level support for small groups while still in Distance Learning would occur when we see declining positivity rate or in Phase 2+.

Criteria for Small Group Support:

- Group of 10 or less
- Focus on students of concern first
- Teacher/Support Staff volunteers



TRANSITION: In Person Instruction Option



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Why a phased in approach?

- Focus on social emotional learning & trauma informed care
- Create a sense of belonging & community
- Establish routines & expectations for In-Person Learning (including health & safety)
- Support staff through transition and provide focused coaching for instructional model & best practices

Phases for transition:

- Two Non-Instructional Days to allow for classroom preparation
- Week 1: Elementary K4-3
- Week 2: Intermediate 4-8
- Week 3: High School 9-12



RECOMMENDATIONS

Past Criteria

- Transportation
 - Transport students to/from schools in reasonable time
- Buildings
 - Accommodate

 students while
 maintaining best
 practices
- COVID Rock County
 - 5.0% on 14-day positivity average

Transition from Percent positive average to and average number of cases per 10,000

(Transition to In-Person recommendation: below 120 cases per 10,000)

Administration Recommendations (Cohort Model - In-Person)

- If In-Person Instruction is approved, Superintendent works with schools to begin transition the first week in February
- Superintendent will be able to follow the direction of the Rock County Health Dept with regards to localized outbreaks (i.e., closing and re-opening)
- While in an In-Person Instructional model, if a school closure is due to staffing shortage, the superintendent will reopen the school once the shortage is eliminated
- Athletics and Extracurricular Activities would be allowed

Administration Recommendations (Distance Learning)

- If remaining in Distance
 Learning, Superintendent will
 work with schools on small
 group support and continue to
 provide regular updates to the
 Board
- Athletics and Extracurricular Activities would be allowed
